Kislingbury Parish Council July 2023

These notes reflect the last two meetings of the Parish Council on 20th June and 18th July 2023. Since the last set of Parish Council Notes, the Parish Council also organised a Village Meeting to discuss the Beech Lane/Camp Lane planning application.

Proposed Development Camp Lane and Beech Lane

The village's response to this application to build 59 houses is definitely the headline of these notes. At the village meeting 56 villagers responded to the Parish Council's invitation to share concerns about this development. The meeting was also an opportunity to outline how the Parish Council was developing its objections and to make the key points of these objections available to villagers to include in their own objections.

The Parish Council objection focused on a number of areas that we thought would carry the most weight. These included responding to the developer's use of a relatively new policy called First Homes. This policy can open up land not previously allocated for housing. A knowledgeable villager pointed us to a recent Planning Inspector decision which rejected an appeal by the same developer (Clayson's Country Homes) on the grounds that the size of the village would be increased by more than the permitted 5%. The Parish Council objection estimated that the proposal would increase the number of households by 10%. The Parish Council also objected on the grounds that the proposed road widening of Camp Lane would detrimentally affect this part of the village Conservation Area.

The Parish Council also cited another Planning Inspector decision which turned down an application because it would destroy a ridge and furrow system, which the developers acknowledge does exist on the proposed site. Other objections related to the effect on the registered byway of Camp Lane and the traffic increase along Beech Lane. If you wish to see the full objection it can be found on the Parish Council Website.

When the application was put in last year over 90 villagers raised objections. If you wish to raise an objection, this is still possible as objections made after the closing date are usually accepted. At the time of writing more than 100 people have done the same this year.

This is a terrific response. Well done Kislingbury!

Just one more comment about this application. At the village meeting, the Parish Council pointed out that with the First Homes' 'discount' of 30% (which only lasts 3 months) the lowest price would be around £250K. This would require a joint income of around £80k. Unfortunately schemes like this hold out little real hope to the vast majority of people hoping to get on the housing ladder.

The application has been "called in" by WNC Councillor Adam Brown which means that the WNC Planning Committee will make the final decision after considering the Planning

Officer's recommendation and hearing from village representation who will include me, another Parish Councillor and a parishioner. The Parish Council will keep the village informed about the progress of this application.

Closure of Rothersthorpe Road

Recently the village has been informed that Rothersthorpe Road will be closed for three months to allow the installation of a footpath from the Pemberton (Spitfire) development. The Parish Council understands the importance of workforce safety while the work is completed. However, despite representations from WNC Councillors, Ward Councillors and the Parish Council the contractors have not, to date, agreed any form of mitigation such as one lane running or limited hours of closure. Given the inevitable disruption to villagers, this is not acceptable. Nor is it acceptable that we still do not have the details of what work is to be undertaken.

The Parish Council will continue to press for the three month closure to be modified.

Children's Play Area

In the two months since the last Parish Council notes, the Parish Council has been engaged in very productive discussions about how to improve the children's play area. The Parish Council also recognises the very considerable effort that the KPFA Trustees are putting in in terms of meeting with equipment suppliers and in raising additional funds.

To support KPFA, the Parish Council has offered up to £10k of Community Infrastructure Levy money for agreed elements of the play area renovation to be match funded by money already raised by KPFA. Our proposal is that this money be spent before the end of 2023 and focused on clearing the current cycle ramps and creating a seating and picnic area with new fencing. KPFA have responded positively to this suggestion and are working on possible costings.

The Parish Council would still like to hear what you think should be the priorities for improving the play area. We are particularly keen to hear from parents and carers of children up to the age of about 11 or 12 what they feel their children would like most. You can do this either by emailing the Parish Clerk, Ann Addison on parishclerk811@btinternet.com or by logging them on the website.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Money

As I noted in the last notes, the Spitfire development means the village is entitled to a significant amount of Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) money. This money has to be spent in ways that can benefit all villagers.

The Parish Council has discussed possible uses of this money. You will see that we have decided to allocate some CIL money to help begin work on renovating the play area. We have also decided that we will purchase 4 new notice boards and replace the village planters. Over the summer we will be drawing up a list of possible 'projects'. Working on the Beech Lane Objection has made it apparent that maintaining the 'feel' of a rural village can play a part in planning decisions, so we will be thinking about this aspect. In addition we will also be mindful of health and safety issues. How can we use CIL money to make the village a safer place?

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Playground Fundraising Update

You will have seen in recent editions that the Kislingbury Playing Fields Association (KPFA) and the Parish Council have been discussing the above over the last few months. At the same time the Trustees of the KPFA have been working on the next stage of fundraising and now is a good time to share the progress to date.

Back in 2020, a group of villagers approached us about replacing the play area and through fundraising events and donations from generous individuals and local companies raised about 20% of the initial cost estimate. Further fundraising has taken the total amount received/pledged to about 33% of this value. All of this money is ring fenced in the KPFA accounts and will not be spent on anything else.

The current phase is to use this fundraising as a base for us to approach National Funding Bodies for the remaining funding. This is quite a slow process requiring a lot of pre-work to identify the best bodies to approach, providing the supporting information they require and it takes time for the bodies to make a decision. It is also difficult to approach too many at a time as the amounts requested may change depending on the outcome of other applications.

Part of the pre-work has been the need to obtain quotations from at least 3 suppliers, we have approached 4 companies and these are working on designs at the moment. By the end of August we should have 4 exciting proposals to choose from.

We then want to share these with the village and get the feedback of both parents and children about these plans and will work with the Parish Council to give as many people as possible a chance to share their thoughts.

At the suggestion of the Parish Council and with their help and support, we are working together, to deliver a new seating and picnic area in the Autumn of this year. It is likely to have a number of pieces of play equipment for younger children near to it. The Parish Council will allocate up to £10k from the Community Infrastructure Levy money, which KPFA will match from the funding raised so far. It will be great to see the project start to come to life.

For the larger project, timing has to depend on fundraising, but we would hope to complete the work in the early Spring of next year, so that it is open for next Summer. There will be some activities where we could save money (for example, clearing existing equipment and installing new fencing) and we would welcome support with these tasks from local businesses and individuals.

Kislingbury Amblers



We are a group of like minded individuals who meet usually on the first and third Wednesday of each month to have a walk of about 5 miles in the local area and then a pub lunch.

<u>Second May Walk</u> - Nine walkers met in Harrington on a perfect summer morning for a five mile walk. Although Harrington is a small village it has quite an interesting history. A former manor, which was demolished in 1745, had belonged to the Tollemache family after whom the local pub is named. Harrington also has the Carpetbagger Aviation Museum which has exhibits about USAAF bomber group, clandestine WW2 missions and Cold War missile site.

Our group had been given permission to use the pub car park and, having parked, we set off along the village street. On our left, up a bank, there were two information boards with interesting facts and an explanation for all the humps and hollows in the field to our right. We turned right off the main street and followed the way marker sign. After exercising our lungs with a walk down and then uphill, we turned to admire the wonderful view. We then passed through a field with sheep and eventually crossed an attractive little bridge beside a ford.

We decided to make a short detour into the village of Arthingworth before we walked on to Newbottle Bridge. Many comments were made regarding the wonderfully peaceful area, the views and the birdsong. Having crossed the bridge we turned left to Thorpe Underwood and, from here, we headed to St Peter and St Paul's Church. Finally, we reached the Tollemache Arms where lunch was booked.

<u>The first June Walk</u> was undertaken by 11 amblers to visit the historically interesting Brockhall area.

The route through Brockhall is hilly in places and we followed the quiet, seldom used private roads and Grand Union Canal. We decided to take the easier route of around 4.5 miles. We parked in the Heart of the Shires' car park. The weather was mild, with sunshine, some cloud and around 18 degrees.

After leaving the car park, we followed the dirt track downhill before crossing the railway, the canal and finally the M1 motorway. We passed an ancient farm house and buildings. The outline remains of the double moated, medieval village of Muscott became clearly visible. Muscott is recorded in the Domesday Book. For future interest, a possible alternative route to be considered would be to follow the sign posts to the historic village of Whilton, adding around two miles. We turned right at the cross roads and followed the lane which became steeper until we entered the small settlement of Brockhall. Brockhall is also mentioned in the Domesday Book. There are a few period houses, church and the old Hall which dominates the village. During WW2, the hall was used by the United States for the purposes of planning

strategic operations and which eventually led to the formation of the CIA. The hall has now been converted into apartments and is closed to the general public. There are several other interesting buildings and points of interest in Brockhall.

After a few minutes walk through Brockhall, the return part of our journey was mostly downhill to the canal bridge. We followed the canal route for around half a mile when we reached the bridge sign posted to the Heart of the Shires, where we followed the track back to the car park.

<u>Second June walk</u> - 9 walkers met at the Greyhound pub, Milton Malsor for a 5 mile walk taking in Blisworth. Before leaving the pub the Leader informed the group that originally in front of the pub was the site of a cycle speedway track which was used by the village team to compete against other villages.

Leaving the Greyhound we crossed the old A43 and climbed the stile and followed the footpath across the grass fields (originally the Milton Sandpit) to cross the new A43 which we followed to Gayton Road and the canal. We then took the towpath towards Blisworth. We observed several sites of interest, the old Northampton to Blisworth railway, Milton brickworks (served by the canal), the claypit where clay was extracted to line the canal which is now Gayton Marina. We left the canal and walked through the Blisworth Arm noting the old canal maintenance yard, toll house and pub all now privately owned. Rejoining the canal we walked under the A43 past the remains of the bridge which took the old railway over the canal.

Arriving on the outskirts of Blisworth we had a break then proceeded as far as Blisworth Tunnel where we joined the road heading back toward Blisworth. We turned into the allotments, most of which are well tended, and then zig-zagged through the houses towards the Football Club. Leaving the playing field we entered open farmland following the path to the footbridge over the railway. On the way we observed the 900 acre new rail freight terminal being built between the Northampton branch line and Junction 15 of the M1 motorway.

Some of the walkers showed an interest in the crop being grown in the fields we were crossing, which was barley heavily contaminated with Black Grass, which uncontrolled can lead to much reduced cropping and dramatic yield loss.

On reaching Barn Lane we walked back to Milton Malsor for lunch in the Greyhound.

<u>First July walk</u>- Commonwealth war graves, the Nene Way, open fields, Watling Street and the West Coast Mainline, and that was all in the first mile of the Amblers' first walk of July...

After heavy rain the day before, the prospects for this walk didn't look too good, but this Wednesday morning was bright and sunny. We began at Flore – barely a few miles from Kislingbury but still offering some surprises for our group. The walk began at the Playing Field's car park close to (but well hidden from) Flore Church.

The first part of the route began in the churchyard – hence the war graves – then southwest along part of the Nene Way to a footbridge crossing the Nene itself. Here the river is modest yet crystal clear. Across another field then a dash across the A5 with a 'thank you' to considerate drivers.

Up a gravel road and we reached one of those memorable points in Northamptonshire where the Grand Union Canal and the Railway are immediately adjacent to one another. Going under the bridge revealed complex brickwork bearing deeply scoured grooves from rope burn - evidencing the labour and skill involved in its construction and its importance to 19th Century trade.

As we headed east along the towpath, two trains swooshed past us on the tracks opposite – one in either direction – reminding us we were in the 21st century.

Passing back under the A5 near the Narrow Boat pub, we followed the secluded and not too muddy towpath until we reached Bridge 27. Local knowledge told us the local coffin-maker's workshop was here until well into the 1960's. Decision time. More of the canal or across the fields to Nether Heyford? We chose the open route – with a big sky and views across the valley we passed through fields of broad beans, corn and oilseed rape along well maintained rights of way (and several stiles) to reach the outskirts of the village.

Taking a route past the church and houses of all eras and architecture, we picked up another section of the Nene Way to take us back to our starting point. Past historically significant ox pens and the much renovated Heyford Mill, we headed back to Flore. This meant passing beneath zizzing electricity pylons, negotiating our way through a field of cows and then past other livestock to reach Flore after four and a half miles of easy walking.

With appetites suitably stimulated we made our way to the Red Lion Truck Stop on the A4500. Some of our number were unable to wait for the fine lunch menu and were forced to go for the big breakfast.

Life eh?

<u>Second July Walk</u> - We met in the car park of the Red Lion in Crick, after preordering lunch we headed down Main Road in the direction of West Haddon. Upon reaching the roundabout we turned left heading across the fields in the direction of Crack's Hill and Crick Millennium Wood. Alongside the wood an interesting feature was noticed by our beloved leader, trees planted in commemoration of births rather than the remembrance of a life already spent.

Entering Yelvertoft along Cricket Field Lane, the cricket club having moved to the outskirts of the village, one of our walkers was bitten by a wire haired terrier, which seemed to have an attitude problem. When we reached the High Street we turned right towards the canal, this road follows the course of an ancient Portway known as Salters Way. On reaching the canal we walked along the tow path towards Crick Marina and on to the Red Lion for an excellent lunch. On the way we observed two swans accompanied by their three cygnets and a mother mallard with her three chicks.

<u>Vaccinations for the 2023 influenza season</u> are due to start being administered to patients who meet the specific criteria w/c 2nd October 2023.

<u>Shingles:</u> If you are aged between 70 – 79 you are eligible for singles vaccine. Shingles (also known as herpes zoster) is an infection of a nerve and the skin around it. It is caused by the varicella-zoster virus, which also causes chicken pox. Should you wish to receive a vaccination against Shingles, please ask our reception team to book you an appointment.

<u>Pneumococcal Vaccine</u> – who should have this?

There are four groups of people who are advised to get vaccinated against pneumococcal infections: babies, people aged 65 and over, anyone from the ages of 2 –64 with health conditions that increases their risk of pneumococcal infection, anyone at occupation risk, such as welders.

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From The Rector

During the summer, we're often prompted to think about holidays.

Perhaps you've already been away and you're thinking about the next one. Perhaps it's booked and still to come. I'm aware that, for many of us, just thinking about holidays is hard as we can't afford to go away as far, or for as long, or at all. Whether you're able to get away or not, I hope that it's possible for you to get some rest over the next few weeks and months.

It may come as a surprise, but the Bible speaks highly of rest! Yes, work is commended, but God knows that rest is good and that we need it. He desires it for us since it doesn't come naturally to us.

As much as we like the idea of rest, it's hard for us to find, as we're naturally 'doers'. We 'do' in order to earn money, love, acceptance, recognition, respect... and so much else. True, enduring rest proves elusive. Rest substitutes are offered all around us. More leisure, a better job, more money, retirement, that holiday, etc. —things that promise rest surround us. Even if we find some rest, it's never enough... or it never lasts...

A few days away won't accomplish what we all desire... Yes, it's great to get away, have a change of scene, or a change of routine at least, but this only ever temporarily satisfies our need for rest.

St Augustine famously wrote "...our hearts are restless until they find their rest in You". The 'You' he refers to is, of course, God. It is when we put our trust in God, and live for God, that we find rest.

To rest, we have to trust that God will take care of things for us. We have to trust that, if we take a day off, the world will not stop turning on its axis.

Jesus himself said: "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls." Rest isn't to be found in where we go, or in what activities we pursue, but in whom we trust and follow. It's a personal invitation, not to a programme or a philosophy or an '-ism' but a person.

Column inches will not allow me to explain this fully, but do ask me more if you're curious... I'd love to explain! In short, what Jesus promises us is a deep and satisfying spiritual rest in Him. Jesus invites those who are weary and burdened to come to Him, for knowing him can calm restless hearts and satisfy our soul's desire for hope, purpose, identity, satisfaction, confidence, acceptance, rescue, and life!
