Kislingbury Parish Council November 2023

These notes reflect the Parish Council's October and November meetings. The December meeting will be held on Tuesday, 5th December 2023.

Planning applications

It is disappointing to have to report that most of the issues discussed in the last two editions of the Kislingbury News are still not resolved. We are still waiting for further news about the Beech Lane and Hodges Lane developments. Villagers will have noticed that there are now traffic calming measures on the Rothersthorpe Road near the Spitfire Pembleton development and that there is a new footpath with numerous street lights. We were concerned about the safety of pedestrians coming out of Pembleton, especially children going to the village school but we would have liked more consultation about how their safety would be best assured.

The issues about water run-off from Pembleton and the impact on ditches is still one that we will discuss with the Spitfire site manager.

Road Closures

Since the September Parish Council Notes, the village has been impacted by a one-way system near the river bridge. At the time of writing the work appears to be coming to an end although there is still work to be done to link the pipes on either side of the river. This section passes through the small island on the downstream side of the bridge which, for reasons lost in the mists of time, is owned by the Parish Council. We have agreed access to this land. We will make our views known if, once the work is finished, the areas that have been affected are not fully restored.

As the last set of notes pointed out, the Parish Council does nor receive advance warning of road closure, so please do alert villagers via the Village Facebook page. There was one posted recently about an Anglia Water 5 day closure that will affect Church Lane.

Precept 2024/2025

The precept is the money we request from West Northants Council in order to run services in the village. We include an element to enable us to make grants to village organisations. We will be making our final decision about the 2024/25 precept at our meeting on 5th December 2023, so there is still a little time if you would like to ask our Parish Clerk for a grant application form.

I will report on the final precept request once it has been agreed by the Parish Council but, without anticipating that decision, it looks as though there will only be a very small increase.

CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy)

While on the subject of money, I would like to repeat the thanks in the last Kislingbury News to those who have made suggestions about how this money (which is a levy on house building) might be spent. In the New Year, the Parish Council will be working out a list of priorities, informed by health and safety concerns, and a schedule of spending.

Parish Council Website

All Parish Councils are required to have a public-facing website to ensure that their decisions and finances are transparent. Thanks to all the hard work by Janet Mallett our new website is now technically compliant. We will shortly be uploading finance and audit reports to ensure that we are compliant in this respect too.

Councillors

We still have one vacancy for a councillor. If you think you might be interested do please contact Ann Addison or me to discuss what is involved and what you might be able to contribute.

Chris and Mick Abbott

Chris and Mick have lived in the village for 55 years. They are a fine example of those villagers who just get on with their life whilst quietly and consistently supporting Village Groups and Organisations. If you are a member of the Bowls Club or the Kislingbury Amblers, you will be aware of their commitment and hard work. If not, then read on to find out more, and to learn about their post war childhoods and how they met.

Chris's early life

"I was born and brought up in Northampton town centre. My father worked at Webb's Shoe Factory and my mother had local part time cleaning jobs. We lived at first in a rented terraced house, rent was 50p a week. The house had a front parlour which was only used at Christmas, a middle parlour with the only fire in the house, a kitchen, and a cellar where food was kept. There were 3 bedrooms, one for my mum and dad, one for

me and my sister Marion, and a back bedroom for my grandma. There was an unlit outdoor toilet with newspaper for toilet paper. No flush, so a bucket of water was required. Baths were taken in a tin bath in front of the fire until we were too big and then Mum took us to the Slipper Baths in St Andrews (now the super sausage café). There were individual cubicles, and a lady would take away the top of the taps so you could not put more hot water in. So too bad if you put too much cold water in! Thinking back on my life then we were much better off than others, as many families had three or more children and many parents were not working.

We moved to a council house in 1957. This was really special for us as we moved to a three bedroom house with heating, an internal bathroom and two loos. Really posh!

As a child I joined the local Girls' Brigade where my mum helped out. I played in the band and took part in a National Competition which we won and got to perform at the Albert Hall. I also joined the church choir: we seemed to go to church a lot then!"

Chris's Schooling and early working life

"I went to Spring Lane Primary School, which was at the bottom of our street, so I went home for lunch. I passed the 11 plus and chose to go to the Technical High School in Trinity Avenue. I did not want to go to the Grammar School where my sister went. Up until that time, I had always had my sister's old clothes. However, the grammar school wore navy, and the Tech

wore green so I could not have any of her old uniform; not even her knickers as ours were green. Thinking back this was very selfish as mum and dad must have really struggled financially to kit us both out. Once we had moved in 1957, I had to cycle to school and my mum and dad had to save every week to get me a bike as a Christmas present.

I enjoyed school and became a prefect and then Head Girl for a year in the sixth form. However, most of my friends had left school by then so I decided to leave as well at 17 to earn some money. I took a shorthand and typing course and then found secretarial and office jobs first in an insurance company, where I stayed for 4 and a half years, then for the police for another 4 and a half years before moving to work for the Area Health Authority as secretary to the Area Treasurer and on to Princess Marina Hospital where I stayed until I became pregnant with my first child, John."

Mick's early life

"I was born during the war in Bragborough Hall, just outside Braunston. This was a home for evacuee mothers, but I think it must also have been a maternity unit during the war. My father and mother lived in Earls Barton, and I grew up there with my 2 older sisters. We lived in a converted pub next door to my father's business, which was a car sales and repair garage. During the war, the garage was used by the military as a cinema as well as being used to service instruments used in air planes. My father also had a timber clearing business where my mother used to drive the tractor to move timber. I remember messing about in the garage and riding on the tractor with my mum.

As a child, my father arranged for me to have swimming lessons at the Mounts in Northampton. I also joined the Church Lads' Brigade. As a teenager I continued swimming at the Mounts, joined a fishing club and gradually cycled more so I could visit Northampton on Saturday mornings to go to cafes to hear the latest records. Sundays were spent serving petrol in my father's garage."

Mick's schooling and early working life

"I hated school. I went to Earls Barton Infant and Primary School. I remember celebrating the Queen's coronation in 1953 and I still have the celebration cup. I also remember two elderly female teachers who would thump pupils in the back while we were trying to study: some of us ended up with bad nerves and painful backs. Playtime in the playground gave me pneumonia twice as it always seemed to be raining. In the corners of the playground, we had squash corners where the big boys would squash the smaller boys. I then went to John Lea School in Wellingborough as there was a bus there. I spent many times in the headmaster's office waiting to be caned for talking. When the bus journey started to get a bit rough and tumble, several of us decided to cycle to school.

I left school at 16 and had wanted to work in my father's garage, but he decided I should do an apprenticeship, so I chose one at Hollingsworth Auto Electrical in Bridge Street where I remained for the whole of my working life and eventually became a tachograph technician. I was working with a group of guys about the same age, and we had a lot of fun despite

working conditions being bad in the winter. I still have friends from that time. I started off cycling to work until I bought a moped. This enabled me to travel to Silverstone every Saturday. Being car mad, I could not wait to get my first car, this being a 23-year-old 1 owner ford Y type 8. Secretly a Ford 10 supplied a more powerful engine with modifications, and this meant we could outdo more modern machines on disused airfields."

Life together and in Kislingbury

Mick: "In 1963, one of my work mates, Richard, and his girlfriend Sue, a friend of Chris, arranged a blind date for Chris and myself, and the rest is history! We got married in 1967 in St Giles Church, Northampton. We had to live with my parents for six months while our house in Kislingbury was finished."

Chris: "There was no particular reason why we chose Kislingbury, it was just that we both fancied living in a village which was not too far away from Northampton, and there was a house we could afford in Kislingbury. The houses in Willow View were all new and families were at similar stages in their lives, which was great. However, we did not really get involved in village life for another 10 years, when we had children, as we both worked full time. We then got to know people through school and the Boys' Brigade, where I helped out. I was also secretary for the Parish Council for a while and got to know people through that. I got a job at The Cromwell, as it fitted round caring for our 2 children. As the children got older, I returned to part time work in administration, finally retiring when I was 62. In my fifties I also started to get involved with the Kislingbury Bowls club. I was Captain, Secretary and then President for 4 years but have recently given up holding any office for the club to concentrate on just playing."

Mick: "I took up competitive indoor target shooting and have been competition secretary for several years for a local club. I also took over organising the village Amblers Walking Group, from Dennis Tidmarsh, which I have run for over 10 years. I have greatly enjoyed doing this. I now spend a lot of time gardening and taking life at a slower pace. I also enjoy tinkering with my self-built car."

Changes in the village

"When we moved here, the village was small enough to feel you knew most people. It is still friendly with a lot going on for villagers, but it has grown so much that we don't know a lot of people anymore. There is not a lot for young people anymore. There used to be the Boys' Brigade and the Youth Club but neither of these have run for some time now.

It may sound selfish but neither of us want to see a large expansion of the village but would certainly like to see houses which the children of our village could afford and enable them to remain here. Also, traffic passing through the village in large numbers has certainly increased but this is probably viewed by some as progress!! Hopefully, in years to come, residents will still be able to enjoy village life in Kislingbury as we have and hope to do in the coming years."

October First Walk - The challenge of this walk undertaken by 12 amblers was to make our way to the ever popular 'Old Dairy' Farm Craft Centre. The weather was ideal for our 6 mile trek.

After parking at St Michael's Church Bugbrooke, we quickly picked up the bridleway opposite taking us across a level field and across the Nether Heyford road to the former Old Crown Pub. The terrain became a little hilly at this point eventually reaching a favourite treat of crossing the iron railway bridge. The challenge of the hills continued with the walk through the well known 'Motocross' area which was quiet being mid-week. Eventually we reached the busy A5 Watling Street Roman Road.

Further up the hill our walkers were surprised to encounter a full size 'mannequin' pointing the way to be taken; possibly left by a local farmer. By now our amblers were beginning to think of refreshment and after entering Upper Stowe and passing some houses we reached our well deserved rest stop of the 'Old Dairy'.

After perusing the interesting craft shops and art galleries together with fortification of tea, cakes etc. we set off once again. At this point the sign posted route became downhill giving magnificent views to the west and east.

After reaching Church Stowe, we turned right and followed the road to the A5 crossing to follow the designated route. Following the field perimeter we passed the route of the disused railway on the outskirts of Nether Heyford used to transport materials to and from the iron works. We turned right through a kissing gate and followed the path through a copse to reach a low headroom, narrow tunnel under the railway line. We then crossed the field to the sign posted path to Furnace Lane.

On reaching Furnace Lane, we turned left to canal bridge No. 32 and followed the towpath along the Grand Union Canal to bridge No. 35 taking us back to Bugbrooke St Michael's Church car park. 13 amblers went for lunch at the Cromwell Cottage restaurant.

October Second Walk - This walk commenced from the housing estate off the Northampton Road, Towcester, where all the addresses are named after famous F1 racing drivers. At the appointed departure time we were one walker short, so after a flurry of phone calls it was decided to meet in Hulcote.

Crossing the Northampton Road we entered the Easton Neston Estate through a small arch to the left of the gates to the estate. Making our way through the woodland area and grassland we entered the village of Hulcote. No sign of our missing walker, further phone calls, will meet us in Shutlanger.

Leaving the village we walked through a very large field, on reaching the road we turned left, over or through a ford and walked under the now dismantled Stratford upon Avon and Midland Junction Railway (SMJR).

Joining the Showsley Road we turned right towards Shutlanger, passing through the tiny village of Showsley. Our missing walker remained missing! We turned into Shutlanger Road, then after a short distance turned right walking across two fields until we reached the large field previously mentioned, we went back to Hulcote the way we had come heading towards our cars and lunch. At which our missing walker turned up with a tale too long to go through in this report!

Once again thanks go to our beloved leader who really has mastered the art of leading from the back with a series of shouts and hand signals.

November First Walk - After parking, which was a bit of a trauma due to one ticket machine being out of order and the other being problematic, a group of 12 walkers plus Jack, a golden retriever, left Brixworth Country Park to walk in a clockwise direction around Pitsford Reservoir.

On the first section up to our mid walk stop, we saw a couple of newly renovated farmhouses set in stunning locations overlooking the water. When crossing the Causeway we spotted a large drainage pipe which ran from the path level to the surfaces of the water, various guesses were put forward to what it could be used for the best being for adding fish to the Reservoir.

After our break and Jack having several dips into the water we continued around the reservoir. A number of anglers were out some in boats and others were on the bank but we did not see any fish caught. A number of birds were spotted, the most interesting being a cormorant with wings outstretched in the sun. Reaching the dam we noticed the water level was approx. 1 metre below the overflow weir. The group saw what appeared to be wind surfers but apparently they were riding wind hydrofoils which is a surf board with a much smaller skimming foil mounted underneath which allows the riders to surf higher out of the water as speed builds up.

Leaving the dam we passed the Boat Club arriving back at the car park having walked about 6.5 miles. The group then drove back to Kingsthorpe for lunch at the Old Cobbler pub.

November Second Walk - This walk took our amblers to historic Brixworth. We parked at the 'George Inn' with prior consent. Eight walkers took part with 11 staying for lunch at the George. The walk was approx. 5 miles and the going was hilly with muddy areas.

We followed the main road out of Brixworth for approx. half a mile and turned right down Merry Tom Lane. The history tells us that Merry Tom was a horse owned by the Earl Spencer in the 1700's that broke it's neck attempting to jump the River Nene!! Eventually we reached the Brampton Valley Railway route where we turned right. Good views to the west.

On reaching the car park at Spratton Road we turned right and followed the bridleway back to Brixworth. Unfortunately, we did not have time to visit the impressive Anglo-Saxon All Saints' Church. We walked past a number of houses in Brixworth displaying a blue plaque giving details of their previous function and history.

Lunch was taken at The George.

Tales from the Kislingbury Archives

Taken from The Village Scrapbook 1953 - Christmas Eve

Fifty years ago, many more people went carol singing, generally in family groups. The Billingham Glee Party went singing carols at all the big houses in the district, in other villages as well and would often be invited in for a mince pie or glass of beer.

Later the Baptist Chapel Singers toured the village singing carols and collecting money for the Sunshine Committee to spend on buying gifts for the aged and ill. These were distributed on Boxing Day. The Baptist Choir Supper was an event every Christmas. Great joints of beef with Yorkshire puddings and potatoes in tins half as big as a table were baked at Hedges' Bakehouse and carried up to the Chapel Schoolrooms. Recitations, songs and games always followed. Nowadays the suppers have declined to meat teas.

The Church Choir also held a supper in the Schoolrooms and once upon a time, the Rector always gave the bell ringers a feast at the Rectory. The bell ringers always used to come round collecting on Christmas Eve at one time. The Male Voice Choir of the village under the conductorship of Mr. A. G. Billingham always gave a tea to all the old folks at the Day Schools. This custom was taken over by the British Legion after the Second World War.
